We have come a long way since the beginning of the partnership in 1964 between our New York State Elks Association and Cerebral Palsy of New York. This was also the beginning of our Major Project. The Home Service Program started with two persons in 1966, with the concept of mobile services to people with developmental disabilities and their families. Today there are 28 Home Service Directors serving the 22 Affiliates of C.P. of NY. The main objective of the Home Service Directors is to provide direct service in their local communities to the children and adults with developmental disabilities and their families. This has resulted in a distinct improvement in the quality of life for these individuals. The role of the Home Service Director has expanded considerably since its early beginnings. The main role of the Home Service Director today is to provide individualized service to every one of their clients. To do so, the Home Service Directors must travel thousands of miles throughout our state to bring the client and services together. As part of this process the Home Service Director provides referrals for evaluation, counseling, and program development. Since the aim and goal is to aid those with developmental disabilities to pursue and achieve a productive life, services have to be found and established to meet the The Home Service individual's needs. Directors must be skilled advocates; they often guide their clients through all of the legal mandates and public entitlement requirements. In most cases it is their presence as they accompany families to government agencies in pursuit desperately needed services that often make the difference between obtaining these services and being turned down. These are just some of the many works that the Home Service Directors do on a daily basis. The hundreds of thousands of people with developmental disabilities and their families who have been helped by the Home Service Program since its beginning thank all of **YOU** for your generous support over these many years.

I believe that the following quote by St. Francis perfectly describes the Home Service Program and all of the hard work and dedication of our New York State Elks Association:

"Start by doing what's necessary; then do what's possible; and suddenly you are doing the impossible!"

MAJOR PROJECTS REPORT

The past few months have been interesting to say the least. Between the Ambassadors and the Chair we have had five surgeries, some planned and some not.



Caitlin had major surgery on both legs to correct defects caused by Cerebral Palsy. This surgery was planned after she reached a certain growth plate. Everything went well and after several months in

braces she has started to walk more with crutches and using her wheelchair less. Physical Therapy has been a constant part of her life and will continue to be for a long time. Caitlin is able to take a few steps without the aid of any device and she is excited about that.

Caitlin leg coordination has improved so much she is learning to drive. This is a huge step forward for her.



Joseph had major surgery on both hips to correct problems that he had since birth. After several months in a partial body cast he is up and about doing many things he was doing before surgery plus some new things. Like Caitlin, Physical Therapy

and Joseph are constant companions but he continues to improve each day.

Both Ambassadors have been able to travel to events when available and they really enjoy meeting all the great Elks of New York State. They appreciate your concern for their recovery and look forward to meeting more of you in the next few months.

The Chair surgeries went well. One was planned and the other two were not planned.

Like the Ambassadors I am a frequent visitor to a Physical Therapist almost on a daily basis.

Many thanks for all the cards and phone calls. They were appreciated.

My theme has been the Home Service Directors and their work for people with disabilities. Both workshops have focused on this work and how valuable it is to their clients.

Elsewhere in the paper is an article by Jamie Peace, Chair, and NYS Elks Major Project Board concerning the work done by the Home Service Directors. These are amazing people and we, as Elks, are fortunate to be able to work along side them. They are the most amazing group of professionals and I consider it an honor to work with them and call them friends.
